# The Rich Tapestry of Inclusion

#### **OVERVIEW AND OBJECTIVES**

Playgroup naturally brings together children, carers, and families, creating and supporting meaningful connections and relationships within and beyond playgroup. How do these 'building blocks' of our community encourage, support and promote experiences of inclusion? Is it possible that playgroup provides a place for inclusion that results in an enduring influence for our communities and society?

The Playgroup Victoria Annual Conference 2020 is the opportunity for you to contribute to conversations and be a visionary of playgroup practice, who seeks to ensure that acceptance and equity are standard, and not an exception in playgroup - children and families first early years' experience. Families' timely and opportune involvement in playgroup can have lasting and far reaching impact on children's learning, development and wellbeing, positive family functioning and quality of life. The scope of impact extends into the broader community, through increased social capital. Playgroups "... ideally create a community that values diversity and includes people as they are" (Hyde, Robert and Conway, 2010). Inclusive practices support the gathering of individual that enable "shared understandings of various contexts or life situations that are interpreted from relationships and collaboration" (Keefe and Carrington, 2007, p. 28).

We understand that people do not enter the debate on inclusion until they first understand what inclusion is. Effectively grasping this concept entails defining inclusion and also understanding the underlying theory behind the concept.

In the broader sense, inclusion encapsulates civil rights and social justice; "empowering access to opportunity,

addressing structural inequalities, tackling unconscious bias and developing inclusive organisations." (Family Safety Victoria 2019, pi) We pursue inclusion with the objective of achieving an equitable society in which all can participate and prosper, and where conditions permit all to reach their full potential. (Family Safety Victoria 2019)

The early childhood and social service system defines and underpins inclusion with diverse principles and values. The commonalities in these definitions, principles and values have aptly been categorised into three broad dimensions: Access, Participation and Outcomes (Early Childhood Intervention Australia 2016); "Inclusion means that every child has access to, participates meaningfully in, and experiences positive outcomes from early childhood education and care programs" (Early Childhood Intervention Australia 2016, p20). Relating this to playgroup, this explanation of inclusion extends to parents/carers, families and their community.

It is important to acknowledge participation and inclusion as recognisable human rights as is stated in many relevant declarations, laws, and frameworks, e.g. EYLF, VEYLDF, UN international convention on the rights of the child.

Playgroup provides an opportunity to be an inclusive place for children and their families.

Bringing children together irrespective of their differences provides an opportunity for them to learn and appreciate differences, yet similarities between us, and accept other people's perspective (Atmakur 2013). Playgroups could therefore act as "joyful incubators of a more inclusive society, in which children ... [can] participate equally and enjoy equal opportunities to flourish." (Atmakur 2013, p1)
